## **OBJECTIVE**

## Write a 300-word story on the theme "The Party".

The Write Stuff is celebrating its 10th year in 2024. So, after a decade of competitions, we're throwing a party for our next writing challenge. Your story can contain up to 300 words, plus a title to set the scene. You can choose the setting, the characters and the plot for whatever kind of party your imagination can conjure up.

For example, you might want to create the start of a murder mystery through a title like 'The Party at Macabre Manor'. Or perhaps you prefer a science fiction setting such as 'The Party at World's End' or want to set up a ghost story with a title such as 'The Party's Last Guest'. The choice is yours.

We look forward to celebrating this special anniversary with your stories – and whatever party they bring to the table.

Competition entries must be solely the unassisted work of the entrant.

## Rashmi Sirdeshpande (Primary Judge)

Rashmi Sirdeshpande is an award-winning children's author and a former World Book Day author whose books have been published around the world and featured in a number of newspapers from The Guardian to The Wall Street Journal. Her first picture book, *Never Show a T-Rex a Book*, illustrated by Diane Ewen, won the Society of Authors Queen's Knickers Awards and the Anna Dewdney Award in the USA and was shortlisted for the Lollies. The sequel, *Never Teach a Stegosaurus To Do Sums*, was shortlisted for the Sainsbury's Children's Book Awards and was a Children's Book Council Children's Favourites and Teacher Favourites winner in the USA.

Sam Copeland is an author, which has come as something of a surprise to him. He is the author of the bestselling *Charlie Changes Into a Chicken* series (the first book of which was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize), *Uma and the Answer to Absolutely Everything* and *Greta and the Ghost Hunters* and *The Bear Behind*. With Jenny Pearson, he has also written *Tuchus & Topps Investigate: The Underpants of Chaos*. His next novel *Alex vs Axel: The Impossible Worlds is coming in 2024*.

## Frances Hardinge (Senior Judge)

Frances Hardinge spent a large part of her childhood in a huge old house that inspired her to write strange stories from an early age. She read English at Oxford University, then got a job at a software company. However, a few years later a persistent friend finally managed to bully Frances into sending a few chapters of *Fly By Night*, her first children's novel, to a publisher. Macmillan made her an immediate offer. The book went on to publish to huge critical acclaim and win the Branford Boase First Novel Award. She has since written many highly acclaimed children's writer; novels including, *Fly By Night* and the 2011 sequel *Twilight Robbery*, as well as the Carnegie shortlisted *Cuckoo Song* and the Costa Book of the Year winner, *The Lie Tree*. Her latest books are *Unraveller* and *Island of Whispers*.



How many different reasons can you think of for throwing a party? Do we need a reason! To celebrate 10 years of the WriteStuff competition, quickly jot down, either on your own or with your neighbour, how many different sorts of parties you can think of?

Birthday

Any of the ideas below can be attempted as creative/design work, a Speaking and Listening exercise or as a piece of writing; this is down to your discretion and as to what suits the age and ability of the students. Of course, one can always provide the basis for the other.

## Design-drawing/painting

- Ø Design a party invitation is it themed? What sort of party are you throwing?
- What would be on your party menu? Design the menu.
- Ø Design the birthday cake you wish you could have!
- What would be in the party bags? Design the bag.
- Take part in a collaborative class picture/painting: a collage of self-portraits of students dressed for a party which could be themed, could be fancy dress or best party frocks!

### **Speaking and Listening**

- Tell your group about the best party you have ever been to; choose the most interesting from each group and they can relate this to the class. What would your perfect party include?
- Describe your favourite party game such as musical chairs, pin the tail on the donkey, treasure hunt.... Devise a new party game and describe this to your classmates. Then try it out!

### Reading and Research

In a group or with a partner, research a celebration; choose one you are unfamiliar with. It may be:

Diwali - the Hindu festival of light.

Hanukkah - the Jewish festival of dedication.

Chinese New Year.

Bar or Bat mitzvah - which celebrates the coming of age for Jewish boys and girls.

Research your chosen subject then present your information to the class, reworking it into a lively, interactive session. You may choose to dress up, you might show some film, you could make posters or invitations to the celebrations – you could even throw a party with some typical foods. You might choose to end with a quiz or a word search to see who's been listening!

© Look at the reading suggestions below, look in your own library and the Guille Allez Library and choose a book about celebrations or one which features a party. When you have read it, give a talk to the class; discuss the book and read an appetising extract.

## Host a Party!

Imagine that it is World Book Day and you are being given the opportunity to host a party for authors you love. In groups of 4-5, each person chooses a writer they would invite; they describe them to the group and also talk about their favourite books that they have read, perhaps reading extracts from favourites. Each group chooses the writer they would all like to come to the party. The 4-5 writers then present themselves to the class on World Book Day-and talk about themselves their work, their favourite characters.

Even better, the students could do this in role, dress up as the author, bring in some of their/your books, use an appropriate accent, take on the whole persona.

Who would you invite to your dream party? Not your friends this time, but celebrities, famous people, royalty, or even historical figures? You are allowed 6 guests.

### **Party Board Game**

Working with a group, devise a board game based upon a party theme. It may be a straightforward birthday party. You could design the board in the shape of a cake, a party invitation, a big balloon... whatever you like!

Invite everyone to make suggestions as to how many squares you will have and how to fill in the squares with birthday themed pictures. You will need a dice and coloured counters.

Discuss the rules e.g. You may need a 6 to start – you've decided to throw a party! You can all think of cunning ideas for making the game more fun. For example, BIRTHDAY PARTY!

### Move forward suggestions:

You send out your invitations, move forward two paces with enthusiasm!

Leap forward 5 spaces when your friends arrive.

A friend has given you some roller skates - zoom forward 3 spaces.

Move forward 4 spaces as you blow out your candles. Whoosh!

Bounce into the air on the bouncy castle and move 2 spaces!

### Move backwards suggestions:

Blow up balloons and decorate the house – this takes time so move back 3 spaces.

You open your presents, miss a go.

You have second helpings of jelly and ice cream, go back 2 spaces.

You fall off the bouncy castle and need a rest. Miss a go.
